Learning to Listen

Moozie® says:

Learning to listen is fun to do; When I'm listening, I cannot talk to you. I sit in my chair and I am quiet, too; Listening teaches me things, so I know what to do.

Before children can be successful they must learn to listen. Listening skills are necessary to developing skills in language and reading. Children must be able to discriminate individual sounds before they can put letter sounds together to build words. These games will help them practice and learn that listening is fun and helpful.

Ways to Guide the Children

- Be a good listener yourself; children model what they see and hear. When a child is talking to you, pay close attention!
- Praise the children often for listening by saying, Thanks for being a good listener. That will help them pay better attention.
- ♥ Encourage and remind them often to develop the good habit of listening.

Simple Listening Awareness Games

Select two common items in a classroom that make an audible sound, such as a bell and a drum. Tell the children to walk around the room or in a circle when they hear the bell, and to stop when they hear the drum. Let the children take turns making the sounds for the group. If you have musical instruments, choose two of them.

Identify sounds in the room, such as opening and closing the door, flipping the light switch, pulling a toy car across the floor, dropping a mat, or cutting paper with scissors. Have children close their eyes and take turns guessing the sound.

Have children select items from the room that will make a noise when they touch each other—pencils, scissors, tin cans, jingle bells, spoons, etc. Using fishing line, tie the items to a clothes hanger and hang where a breeze will move it. Talk about the noises made by the mobile.

Make up a rhythm pattern using parts of the body such as clapping, slapping your thigh, snapping fingers, patting shoulders, hopping. Alternate using two of one sound, then three of another sound. Talk about the different sounds that are made. Which one is loudest or softest?

Let children experiment with sounds of different items by dropping them or tapping them on the table. Consider using cotton balls, keys, blocks, markers, metal spoons (different sizes) or other items they want to try. Ask them which ones make a soft sound and which ones are loud.

Let the children take turns making animal sounds and the other children identify the animal.

Take a listening walk inside the school or outdoors. Ask the children about what sounds they are hearing.



Reading to the Children

Make reading an interactive activity. When reading to the children, stop before turning the page and say, What do you think will happen next? Ask about details in the story so you know how well the children are listening. If they seem unsure, start the story over and tell them to listen carefully.

On different occasions, select a book to read that the children know very well. When reading this time, stop at key points and let the children tell you the words that come next. Or try reading the story and changing key details or words to see if the children are listening carefully. Praise them when they "catch" you saying something different.

Read a book aloud to the children, but stop just before the last page and ask, *How do you think the story will end?* After they answer, finish the story and discuss the ending with them. Did they guess the ending right? Was there a surprise ending? What were the clues in the story that may have predicted the ending?

After you read any book, ask specific questions about the details. For example, in *Moozie's Kind Adventure*_©, ask what kinds of animals were in the story; how many ducks; what were the ducks doing; how did Moozie_® save the ducks.

Speak Kind Language

Kind words make us feel good; Moozie says *please* and *thanks*, so we should. There's lots of kind words that we can say; You're special, terrific and have a great day.

Having a vocabulary of kind words is a wonderful resource for everyone. It not only helps the child to make friends, but to also feel better about themselves when they get a positive reaction by reaching out to others with kind words.

Ways to Guide the Children

- Be a good model by saying kind words to the children and other adults. Be generous with praise when it is deserved. Children know when you are genuine.
- Seek out opportunities to emphasize kind language to the children every day. Keep them aware and alert to words that are kind and ways to be kind.

Game: Simon Says/Moozie. Says



In the game Simon Says, if the leader says, Simon says, stand up, the children stand up. But if the leader only says stand up, without the Simon says part, then the children should not stand up!



In this variation of the game, the leader holds the Moozle puppet and instead of Simon says, the leader states, Moozle says, sit down please, etc. If the leader says, Moozle says, sit down please, the children sit down. If there is no please, the children should not do it! What a great way to get children into the habit of being polite!



In this game, mix some of the usual requests such as *Moozie* says touch your toes, please with *Moozie* says say a kind word, please OR *Moozie* says smile, please OR *Moozie* says show kindness to someone, please (which would be a pat on the back, hug, etc.).



Of course, if the leader does not say *please* and the child does the requested action, that child is out of the game. This rule does not need to be enforced with three-year-olds; just learning to listen and follow directions is more important now than following all the rules.



In the beginning, the leader may need assistance from the teacher.



Speaking Kind Language

Game: "What Moozie. Says"

"What to Say When" Discussion



Children sit in a circle. Read the above rhyme to the children at least twice. Select one child to have the Moozie puppet, explain that all of them will have a turn.



This child stands, holds the puppet and goes to another child and asks, *What is a kind word that Moozle* says? When that child responds properly, he/she receives the Moozle puppetTM and goes to another child and asks the same question.



The game continues until everyone has had an opportunity. Some of them will use the same word. Everyone loves holding MOOZie_®!



Some words to use: Please! Thank you! You're special! Terrific! Super! Great! Wow! How nice! I'm sorry. You're welcome! The children will think of others.





After the game, engage the children in a conversation about how they feel when someone says kind words to them. How do they feel when they say kind words to someone else?



In a group setting, ask the following questions:

- What would you say when someone gives you something?
- What would you say when someone draws you a colorful picture?





What would you say when you want to play with a toy your friend is using?



As the children give their answers ask: What is the kind thing Moozie® would say or do? What is the unkind thing to say or do? How will each of these make you feel?

Taking Turns

Moozie likes to teach us To share and take turns; To get along with others It's a lesson we must learn

At circle or group time, read the rhyme and talk about taking turns with other children being a way to share and make friends. Ask different children, "How do you feel when it is your turn? How do you feel when it is someone else's turn? How does if feel to let others go first?

Ways to Guide the Children

- Keep turn-taking games short at first.
- When playing turn-taking games, be sure each child has a chance to go first.
- ▼ Model appropriate language by saying "your turn" and "my turn".
- Praise the children when you observe them taking turns.
- ▼ It will be difficult for some children, especially three-year-olds to take turns. It will be easier for children who have siblings at home.

Game: Build a Block Tower



Begin with two children in the block area; you can add a third child after they become more skilled at the process.



Tell the children they are going to build a tower (or any shape) together by taking turns. Each child gets a turn to place a block until the project is finished.



Ask them to give their project a name.

Then help the children identify and verbalize their feelings by asking each child the following questions:



How do you like your tower? How do you feel about working together? Were you glad when it was your turn? How did it feel to wait on the other person? What else could you do together?



Game: Duck, Goose Game: Circle Ball Children sit in a circle with their hands on 1 their knees. Children sit in a circle (indoors or outdoors) and roll the ball back and forth to each other. Ways to Guide the Children

- Talk with the children about being sick and ask if they have known someone who has been in a hospital.
- Ask the children how they think that person felt. Would they be glad to know that someone cares about them? How do you feel when others share with you?
- Explain to the children that Moozle goes to the hospital to visit and she will deliver a card from them to another child.
- ♥ Being considerate of others is the beginning of learning to share.

Who of us does not love receiving Get Well Cards or Birthday Cards or cards for just no reason at all! This kindness exercise is a wonderful way for children to perform a random act of kindness. Not only is it a way of showing kindness to someone they don't even know, it is also a great way to create a "gift" to give to another child.

Making A Get Well Card

Customizing the Card

Give each child a paper with the preprinted card on one side. Explain to the children that these cards will be given to children who are sick in the hospital.

Ask each child to draw a colorful picture on the blank side of the paper. Explain that when the hospitalized child receives their card, the drawing will be a wonderful surprise inside the card! The hospitalized child can display the drawing to help brighten their hospital room.

Ask the child if they would like you to help them print a message by their drawing.

In the *Thinking of you and hoping you feel better soon* section, each child can print the information, or they may need help from an adult. Give the *first name only*, and then fill in the remaining blanks. Do not print a return address on the card.

Activities in each collection are designed to fit into your existing curriculum. How-to details are given so that you may use a volunteer to direct the activity. As with teaching other principles at this age, repetition is very important and you are encouraged to repeat the activities as they fit into your lesson plans.
